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

Welcome to Living Hope's Advent Project for the year 2020! We are so glad that you have joined us. We hope that this season can be a special time of reflection of who Jesus is. To help make the season extra special, we have prepared a booklet and some supplies. We know that most of you are experiencing Advent and Christmas in your homes this year and this booklet and wreath is meant to empower you to bring some of the church traditions into your homes.

You are invited to use this book as a guide to thinking deeper about Advent, and also a way of introducing an advent tradition in your household. Rather than lighting the candle during the service, households are encouraged to read through the liturgy and light the candles beforehand as a way of preparing ourselves for our time of worship. In a season where so much of our church and worship is done through a screen, the candles give a reminder of something tactile and present. They help us prepare for a God who came to be with us, in flesh, present. Since March, we have been lighting the Christ candle to represent the radiant presence of Christ. We will be putting that practice on hold for Advent, lighting each candle on the way to the Christ candle, building up our anticipation of the day we celebrate Christ's arrival.

HOW TO USE THIS BOOKLET

The main intention of the booklet is to provide a liturgy for each week of Advent. **The liturgy can be found on pages 9-24** You are encouraged to read through it before hand and assign readers – feel free to be creative for your household – depending on reading ability. There are 4 readers listed. If your household has children that are newer to reading we recommend giving them readers 3 or 4 as they have less challenging lines.

TWO MORE THINGS

Alongside the wreath and the liturgy we are encouraging the households of Living Hope to be a blessing in two specific ways. The first is encouraging others in the church and your community through a Christmas postcard.

The second is by participating in the Build-a-Farm Fundraiser for World Renew which includes some a friendly competition with the other CRC churches in Abbotsford. An independent document has been created to describe this fundraising initiative in detail.



ADVENT POSTCARDS

In the bag you will find 2 postcards. One to a designated person in the church and another to be sent to someone of your choosing! Both postcards already have the postage paid. We ask that you be in prayer as you consider who would appreciate a Christmas postcard this season. It could be someone you know from school or work, someone your related to, someone who you know needs encouragement, or someone in the church!

How To Make Your Wreath

You have been given a bag or a box of supplies for your wreath. Here is a step by step explanation of how to make yours.



STEP 1 Tie the ribbon around the candles.



STEP 2 Place wood somewhere sturdy and arrange the candles on it with the white ribbon in the centre. For extra stability, fix them to the wood with glue.



STEP 3 Add the wreath greenery.



STEP 4 There is no step 4. You're done!

ABOUT ADVENT & THE WREATH

WHY ADVENT?

Advent means arrival – or coming.

We celebrate advent to prepare ourselves for the coming of Jesus.

Advent is the beginning of the Church liturgical year. In the church calendar, advent is meant to stand in contrast to the cultural business of Christmas. In advent, business is replaced by the long wait of Israel for the coming of their messiah. As we look to how others prepared for Jesus, we are reminded of the preparations we share with Israel as we wait and long for Jesus to come again.

By helping us to hope intensely for restoration, to feel our own need to be saved, Advent prepares us for Christmas joy and faith in the one who saves us from our sin, Jesus. ”

WHY A WREATH?



Circle | The wreath, first of all, has a circular shape. The circle, with out beginning or end, reminds us of Jesus' divinity, of his sacrifice in becoming Immanuel, and of his unending love and care for us.



Evergreens | The evergreens, as sign of life amid the starkness of winter, point to Christ's redemptive gift of life, now and forever. With the assurance of this gift, we can eagerly pray for Christ to return and restore all of creation.

WHY CANDLES?

Lighting the candles is a visual aid that helps us better see and understand the season.

Light in darkness is a familiar theme throughout scripture:

- **Genesis 1:1-5** | The Bible begins in darkness and God creating light and declaring it to be good.
- **Psalm 27** | The Lord is described as light and salvation.
- **Isaiah 9 and 11** address Israel as people who walked in darkness and see a great light – and then it goes on to talk about the messiah.
- **Isaiah 59 and 60** speak of waiting for light and experiencing darkness. We depend on God to bring the light.
- **John 1** | Jesus is the life and light for all peoples. The light shines in the darkness and the darkness cannot overcome it.
- **Revelation 21-22** | In renewed creation there is no sun because God's full presence is light.



5 CANDLES | Each Sunday the candles are lit. Each representing a movement towards the light of Christ that is to be lit on Christmas day. Having 4 candles before Christmas helps to sharpen our anticipation for the coming of Jesus.

COLOURS | The different colours of the candles carry symbolism.



Purple | Most advent traditions have purple candles because it is a colour that signifies royalty of the coming King.



Pink/Rose-coloured | This candle is lit on the third Sunday, a time of joy.



White | The centre candle, the Christ candle, is always white. It signifies the purity and light of Christ.

LONG EXPECTED JESUS

WAITING

COVID-19 has been a season of waiting: waiting for in person services; waiting for a chance to be able to see others we have not seen for a long time; and waiting for restrictions to lift. During COVID-19 we have been forced into this waiting. It carries with it some uncertainty, we don't know what our future meetings will look like, but we have a hope that eventually we will be able to gather in larger groups and sing together again. We are waiting for the arrival of news from the health officials to tell us that restrictions are being lifted. This is good news.

Advent is a season for waiting. It is a season where we are reminded of Israel waiting for the arrival of their Saviour. As we look to the many years they waited, we recognize that there was long, expectant waiting for Jesus to come. During advent, we echo this waiting as we long for the second coming of Christ. We join in the call for the long expected Jesus to come again to set all things right. Perhaps because of COVID-19 this waiting is easier to imagine than normal. We collectively share a longing for things to be different. We know what it feels like when things are 'not the way they are supposed to be.'

PREPARING

Advent itself can be translated as 'arriving or coming.' It is a season where we put special attention to the fact that Jesus is coming again and we often do this by entering into Israel's story of Jesus' first arrival. Contrary to it being a time of nativity stories, Advent traditionally is a time of reminding ourselves that things are not as they are supposed to be, and that we are deeply reliant on God to set things right. It is a time of self-awareness, as we look towards the sin that clutters our own lives and we prepare the way of the LORD. As we enter into the advent season, you are invited to consider with your household: How can we prepare ourselves for the coming of Jesus this year?

One way we can prepare ourselves as a church is joining in the tradition of lighting the candles of the advent wreath. Each week as we light the candles, we look expectantly to the day we can light the center candle which represents the coming of Christ – the light to the world!

AS A CHURCH WE WILL BE LOOKING AT THESE
PASSAGES LEADING UP TO CHRISTMAS:

NOV 29 | HOPE

Psalm 25 “You are my God my Savior, and my hope is in you all day long.”

On this week we remember: Jesus is the HOPE of Psalm 25.

DEC 6 | LOVE

Psalm 85 “Show us your unfailing love, O LORD, and grant us your salvation.”

On this week we remember: Jesus demonstrates the unfailing LOVE of Psalm 85.

DEC 13 | JOY

Psalm 126 “The LORD has done great things for me”

On this week we remember: Jesus brings the JOY that is longed for in Psalm 126.

DEC 20 | PEACE

Psalm 122 / 72 “Pray for the peace of Jerusalem”

On this week we remember: Jesus brings the PEACE that Psalm 122 hopes for.

DEC 25 | CHRISTMAS

Psalm 98 “Sing to the LORD a new song, for he has done marvelous things”

On this week we remember: The birth of Jesus is the new song of the LORD doing marvelous things.

FIRST SUNDAY IN ADVENT

READING

READER 1 Today is special because it is the beginning of a new season. We call this season “Advent.”

READER 4 What does that mean?

READER 2 “Advent” is a word that means “to come.” It is a time when we get ready, preparing ourselves for the coming of Jesus Christ. Jesus came when he was born on Christmas day.

READER 3 What are some things that we might do to get ready?

READER 4 We should get our hearts ready by thinking about Him.

READER 2 What we are doing right now around our Advent wreath is a way of preparing for Christmas. This is the first Sunday in Advent.

READER 3 Today, we light one purple candle.

READER 1 The traditional color for Advent is purple which refers to the coming of the royal King, Jesus Christ. Purple is also a deep color that symbolizes spiritual darkness outside the light of Christ.

READER 3 The first candle is the candle of hope.

READER 2 (Light the first candle) I lit this candle to remind us that we wait with hope for the day when we celebrate again the birth of Jesus. We hope that everyone will come to know God and worship God.

ALL Sing: "O COME, O COME, EMMANUEL"

READER 2 Hundreds of years before Jesus was born, God spoke through prophets in the Old Testament to tell people that the Messiah, Jesus Christ, would come. This candle of hope is symbolic of the long years of waiting and hoping for when Jesus Christ would come to save the people from their sins.

READER 1 The Psalms point towards Jesus in ways that show us dependence on God to come and bring salvation from sin. In Psalm 25 it teaches us to place our hope in God saying: “You are my God my Savior, and my hope is in you all day long.”

READER 3 Jesus takes away our sin and we look forward to the day that Jesus comes back again to make all things new. Come, Lord Jesus.

READER 4 Hope was also given in the prophet Isaiah who said: Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel. (7:14)

READER 1 The prophet Isaiah reminds us of the hope that God gives us in Jesus Christ. We have many lights around us at Christmas time.

READER 3 The lights can remind us that Jesus is the light of the world.

READER 4 (Prayer): Thank you, Jesus, for coming to earth, just like the prophets said, and for your promise to come again. Thank you, Jesus, for being our light so we know how to live. AMEN

DISCUSSION

- What is hope?
- Who are the people in our world who need hope?
- What are the hopes we have for our world today?
- How do we help others know that God gives hope?

SECOND SUNDAY IN ADVENT

READING

READER 1 This is the second Sunday in Advent. Do you remember why we are taking time to be together around our Advent wreath?

READER 2 To remember that Advent is a time of preparation. During these days we are getting our hearts ready for the coming of the Christ Child. Today, we light two purple candles.

READER 3 Last time we lit the candle of hope. (*Light the first purple candle.*)

READER 4 I will light another candle today, on the second Sunday in Advent, to remind us that Jesus came to earth to show and tell us of God's love. (*Light the second purple candle.*)

READER 1 During this Advent, we turn to the Psalms that teach us to pray "Show us your unfailing love, O LORD, and grant us your salvation" (Psalm 85). We pray this knowing that it points us to God's gift of Jesus to the world and know that God's love for all people is the reason for this gift.

READER 3 Love comes at Christmas in Jesus Christ.

ALL Sing: "AWAY IN A MANGER"

READER 4 When we look at the second candle, we remember God's love.

READER 1 Matthew 1:18 - "Mary, was engaged to be married to Joseph. But before the marriage took place, while she was still a virgin, she became pregnant through the power of the Holy Spirit."

READER 4 In Matthew 1:20 an angel told Joseph: "The child within her was conceived by the Holy Spirit. And she will have a son, and you are to name Him Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins."

READER 2 John 3:16 - "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life."

READER 3 During Advent we remember God loves us.

READER 1 (Prayer): Thank you, God, for your son, Jesus. Thank you that you love us so much that you sent your Son, Jesus Christ. Help us to love one another, our friends at school, and people everywhere we go. AMEN.

DISCUSSION

- Who are the people in our world who need the message of God's love?
 - How do we help others know God's love?

THIRD SUNDAY IN ADVENT

READING

READER 1 This is the second Sunday in Advent. Do you remember why we are taking time to be together around our Advent wreath?

READER 1 This is the third Sunday in Advent. Do you remember why we are taking time to be together around our Advent wreath?

READER 2 To remember that Advent is a time of preparation. During these days we are getting our hearts ready for the coming of the Christ Child.

READER 3 On the first Sunday we lit the candle of hope. (*Light the first purple candle.*)

READER 4 We wait with hope for the day when we celebrate again the birth of Jesus.

READER 1 On the second Sunday we lit the candle of love to remind us that Jesus came to earth to show and tell us of God's love. (*Light the second purple candle.*)

READER 2 Today, on the third Sunday of Advent, I will light the candle of joy. (*Light the pink candle.*) Pink symbolizes a break in the darkness, and a time of joy as Christ's birthday gets closer.

READER 3 As we light the candle we joyfully say with the Psalmist "the LORD has done great things for me" (Psalm 126). We have joy as we remember God's gift of Jesus to the world.

READER 4 Rejoice!

READER 1 When we look at the third candle, we remember God's promise of joy. God promised to send a Savior to the people.

READER 2 In the Bible, we read of Mary's joy. Luke 1:46-47: Mary said, "Oh, how my soul praises the Lord. How my spirit rejoices in God my Savior!"

READER 3 Mary's words can guide us to look for the joy of God even when things may be uncertain for us.

READER 4 When Jesus was born, the angels comforted shepherds with the joy of the good news.

READER 2 Luke 2:8-11: "There were shepherds staying in the fields nearby, guarding their flocks of sheep. Suddenly, an angel of the Lord appeared among them, and the radiance of the Lord's glory surrounded them. They were terrified, but the angel reassured them. 'Don't be afraid!' he said. 'I bring you good news that will bring great joy to all people. The Savior—yes, the Messiah, the Lord—has been born today in Bethlehem, the city of David!'"

READER 3 During Advent we rejoice.

READER 4 (Prayer): Lord, today we rejoice. We rejoice because our Lord and Savior, Jesus was born. Fill our hearts and our days with joy. We rejoice that you are with us always. Help us live in such a way that our words and our actions help others know of the joy you give. AMEN

DISCUSSION

- Who in our world needs God's joy?
 - What are our hopes for joy in our world today?
 - How do we help others know that God gives joy?

FOURTH SUNDAY IN ADVENT

READING

READER 1 This is the fourth time we are celebrating Advent. Do you remember why we are taking time to be together around our Advent wreath?

READER 2 To remember that Advent is a time of preparation.

READER 3 During these days we are getting our hearts ready for the coming of the Christ Child.

READER 4 The first time we lit the candle of hope. We wait with hope for the day when we celebrate again the birth of Jesus. (*Light the first purple candle.*)

READER 1 The second time we lit the candle of love to remind us that Jesus came to earth to show and tell us of God's love. (*Light the second purple candle.*)

READER 3 We lit the third candle to remind us that the angels told the shepherds "good news that will bring great joy to all people." (*Light the pink candle.*)

READER 2 Today, we light the candle of peace. (*Light the fourth purple candle.*) Our world is not always a peaceful world. People sometimes hurt other people. But God promises peace. During Advent, we pray the words of the Psalmist who says "Peace be within you" (Psalm 122). This is part of the Psalmist's prayer that God's peace goes all places.

ALL Sing: "HARK THE HERALD ANGELS SING"

READER 4 When we look at the fourth candle, we remember that the angels told the shepherds about the Prince of Peace, Jesus Christ.

READER 1 Luke 2:13-14: “Suddenly, the angel was joined by a vast host of others—the armies of heaven—praising God and saying, ‘Glory to God in highest heaven, and peace on earth to those with whom God is pleased.’”

READER 2 Isaiah 9:6: “For a Child is born to us, a Son is given to us. The government will rest on His shoulders. And He will be called: Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.”

READER 1 (Prayer): Thank you, Father, for sending your son, Jesus. Thank you for those in our world today who seek to act for peace. Help us look for ways to be peacemakers at home, at church and at school. AMEN.

DISCUSSION

- What is peace?
 - Who in our world needs to hear about God’s peace?
 - What are our hopes for peace in our world today?

Christmas Day Service



READING

READER 1 Today is Christmas. The day we have waited for and prepared for is finally here!

READER 2 Today we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ.

READER 3 As we waited for this day we lit four candles.

READER 4 The first candle we lit was the candle of hope. *(Light the first purple candle.)*

READER 1 The second time we lit the candle of love. *(Light the second purple candle.)*

READER 2 The third time we lit the candle of Joy. *(Light the pink candle.)*

READER 3 The fourth candle we lit was the candle of peace. *(Light the fourth purple candle.)*

READER 1 Today, on Christmas, we also light the center white candle. This candle represents Jesus. When we light this candle, we remember Jesus' birth. Our waiting has ended. *(Light the center white candle.)*

READER 2 Psalm 98 teaches us to sing saying, "Sing to the LORD a new song, for he has done marvelous things." In Jesus we see God beginning something new, inviting us into new praises! Jesus is born! "The Savior—yes, the Messiah, the Lord—has been born today in Bethlehem, the city of David!" (Luke 2:11)

ALL Sing: "SILENT NIGHT"

READER 4 When we look at the center candle, we remember that Jesus is the light of the world.

READER 1 John 8:12: "Jesus spoke to the people once more and said, 'I am the light of the world. If you follow Me, you won't have to walk in darkness, because you will have the light that leads to life.'"

READER 3 God sent Jesus to give hope, peace, joy, and love to all people.

READER 1 Far away from Bethlehem, wise men saw a star in the sky. They remind us that the gift of Jesus was not just for the people in one place, but for all people.

READER 2 Matthew 2:1-2: “Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the reign of King Herod. About that time some wise men from eastern lands arrived in Jerusalem, asking, ‘Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw His star as it rose, and we have come to worship Him.’”

READER 1 Matthew 2:10-11: “When they saw the star, they were filled with joy! They entered the house and saw the child with His mother, Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped Him. Then they opened their treasure chests and gave Him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.”

READER 4 God used a star to guide the wise men to Jesus.

READER 3 God has guided us to the true meaning of Christmas during advent. God has come into the world in Jesus Christ to be with us so that we will experience God’s hope, joy, love, and peace.

READER 2 (Prayer) Thank you, God, for your son, Jesus. Thank you for sending Jesus for all people. On this Christmas Day, help us remember and rejoice again because Jesus was born. Help us live every day remembering your love and care and showing that love and care to others. AMEN

DISCUSSION

- What are our hopes on this Christmas Day for our world?
- How can we help people remember God's promises after Christmas Day is over?

SOME EXTRA THINGS ABOUT ADVENT

ADVENT THEMES

There is no single advent theme for different Sundays. In the CRC it was not common to have a formal advent season until the 1960s. Since then, a blend of different advent traditions throughout the Christian history have been used by different Christian Reformed Churches. Typically we centre on the words Hope, Love, Joy, and Peace – though the order of these are subject to change. Other times it is a focus on traditional advent candles like the Prophecy candle, Bethlehem candle, Shepherds candle, and Angels candle. Another common option is to have a focus on the themes of light in the midst of darkness throughout scripture. In any case, there is no single ‘advent candle’ theme – but a variety – all of which point towards an anticipation of the coming of Jesus.

1. **HOPE** | Prophecy: remembered those who first spoke the promise of the coming Christ child.
2. **LOVE** | Bethlehem: a symbol of the preparations being made to receive and cradle the Christ child.
3. **HOPE** | Shepherds: remembering the first in a long line of people who joyfully shared the good news of the Savior's birth.
4. **PEACE** | Angels: we were reminded of the hope fulfilled in the first coming of our Savior and of our continuing hope as we anticipate his coming again.
5. **CHRIST** | Christmas Day: Advent season ends. We no longer wait! That great event for which we waited has happened. God's promise of a Redeemer is fulfilled. Christ Jesus is born. We light the Christ candle with praise to our God who brings joy to the world.
